Justification by Faith Alone

Memory Text: "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me." (Galatians 2:20 KJV).

Read and Meditate for This Week's Study:

Galatians 2:15-21; Ephesians 2:12; Philippians 3:9; Romans 3:10-20; Romans 3:8; Genesis 15:5-6; Psalm 119.

Main Thought for the Week: While Justification is a topic that is foundational to Christianity, there are many who do not understand what it actually entails. This special work that is often looked at as the very beginning of the Christian experience, is a work that is done by the grace of God, in the name of Jesus, through the ministration of the Holy Spirit. We must accept this work in our lives by faith, for without faith it is impossible to please God. This week, we are going to take a look at what the Bible teaches about this very important aspect of salvation.

Which Law?

Sunday's Summary - July 16:

SUMMARY THOUGHTS: Before we can understand what Paul is speaking about in Galatians, it is important to understand how he is using the term "the law." Jesus and the apostles often used that term to refer to the 10 Commandments, but sometimes they used it to refer to following as well: (a) The first 5 books of the Bible; (b) All of the laws, statutes and judgments given to Israel by God through Moses. Much confusion arises because people often choose whichever interpretation of "law" they want to suit a particular situation without looking at the context found in the scriptures in question.

SUMMARY THOUGHTS: Faith goes beyond belief, because we are told that the devils "believe and tremble" (James 2:19) - but they lack a saving faith in God. The difference, then, is that the belief they have does not prompt them to take supportin action corresponding to the belief. The same applies to us: If we express faith in God but are unwilling to take the steps that correspond to this action, then what we have is not faith, but belief or theory.
Discuss/Consider: How much of your "faith" falls below the biblical definition of
faith? What has to happen if this is going to change for you?

Wrapping It All Up...

Friday's Summary - July 21:

ILLUMINATION: The same law that was engraved upon the tables of stone is written by the Holy Spirit upon the tables of the heart. Instead of going about to establish our own righteousness we accept the righteousness of Christ. His blood atones for our sins. His obedience is accepted for us. Then the heart renewed by the Holy Spirit will bring forth "the fruits of the Spirit." Through the grace of Christ we shall live in obedience to the law of God written upon our hearts. Having the Spirit of Christ, we shall walk even as He walked. Through the prophet He declared of Himself, "I delight to do Thy will, O My God: yea, Thy law is within My heart." Psalm 40:8. And when among men He said, "The Father hath not left Me alone; for I do always those things that please Him."

That which God required of Adam before his fall was perfect obedience to His law. God requires now what He required of Adam, perfect obedience, righteousness without a flaw, without shortcoming in His sight. God help us to render to Him all His law requires. We cannot do this without that faith that brings Christ's righteousness into daily practice.

And we look forward to the physical restoration that will come at the Second Coming of Christ, which is typically termed "glorification". Salvation is a big topic, and we have only touched the surface of one aspect of it this week. We encourage you to study these passages in depth, as you seek to understand and apply yourself to God's word.
